

A letter Fr Jim wrote for his ordination

Welcome everyone, to this ordination ceremony. I hope that the sacrament being conferred tonight will touch and inspire each of us in some way. We all participate in the Priesthood of Jesus Christ, and for that reason should not consider this a triumph of any personal achievement or virtue on my part. Ordination is a commission to serve, and we all share that mission in one way or another. Hopefully, then, this ceremony will not separate me from you through any material distinction and privileges, honors, and expectations that bankrupt the idea of priestly service. Let this instead be an occasion for the Spirit to awaken in ALL of us (as equals) the desire to serve one another with renewed enthusiasm. Let the Spirit tonight breathe in us the Christian idealism of our youth, so that we may work together to bring the church and the world into a new springtime.

There are many changes we must make in the church and in the world. Sometimes, we need to listen to people like Francis of Assisi, whose feast is traditionally celebrated on the Fourth of October. These are the people who remind us that we are too materialistic and that we have placed our trust in money instead of God. The theme tonight is to seek God above every other concern in life and to let God work out the material comforts we need. All the readings tonight support this theme. We in America have a special obligation not only to detach ourselves from the things we own but to find a dedicated use of them for the poor, the powerless, and the oppressed. The Leaders in the church should be especially sensitive to this need. Instead, however, we are often scandalous consumers of the comforts of life. We priests are too often the first to be served rather than the first to serve others. The feast of St. Francis and the scripture readings were chosen to remind myself and you of the necessity to keep our priorities in tune with the gospel of Jesus Christ.

I welcome your challenges to live this way in the years ahead, as I have welcomed your beautiful support in the past. I am, of course, more than grateful for your presence here tonight.

Today I am thankful for Father Jim Callan – a true Illuminator. Certain people can walk into a room and just light it up – and you, Father Jim, are one of these Illuminators.

Who knew that in 1997 - a decade after first meeting you, in Philadelphia - our family would move to Rochester and join Corpus Christi, whose congregation then broke away to create Spiritus Christi Church. And twelve years after Spiritus Christi was formed, I reached out to you and Rev. Mary about starting a new ministry, Buddy Readers, where volunteers would read one-on-one with a child every week.

Your enthusiasm and support kept me going as we struggled to define and implement this new ministry. You are personally responsible for encouraging so many folks to volunteer with us.

Reader volunteers, and, through your example, to our little buddies. Please know that nothing has a bigger impact on our lives – and the lives of the children we serve - than this!

10 Stewardship

11 Tithing

When Fr. Jim eulogizes someone, he usually starts with the words "a beautiful thing happened on".. and he cites the day the person was born. Well, a beautiful thing happened on March 23, 1976 at Corpus Christi Church-Fr. James Brady Callan was assigned there as assistant pastor. and on July 5, 1977, he was named administrator. Another beautiful event occurred in the Spring

of 1978 when Fr. Jim inspired the parish to tithe 10% of their weekly collection to the poor. Since Corpus Christi was a poor parish, actually a dying parish, and the weekly collection was about \$450, it was a risky and radical idea!

But that is the Fr. Jim we know and love....he took a leap of faith and put the parish totally in God's hands. He believed giving back was the only way the parish could survive and thrive. It was the first check (and still is) that was written each week and placed in the tithing account. God and the poor get the first fruits of our labor, not the leftovers.

A few years later, the parish voted to increase it to 12%; knowing that our generosity to the poor was a reflection of God's unconditional love and the fact that we had a growing, loving community. When we became Spiritus Christi, Fr. Jim once again risked, and trusted Jesus as our pastor and inspired the parish to raise our tithe to 15%, even though we were venturing into the unknown.

Until recently, Fr. Jim oversaw the tithing committee, and it was a blessing to have his loving support and encouragement at each meeting. He helped us discern which nominated organizations would benefit from our tithe; he said a resounding yes to 99.9% of them. Each year we have tithed to organizations that serve poor women, men and children from the Monroe County area, surrounding counties as well as from everywhere in the US, Central and South America and as far away as Africa. These are organizations that feed, clothe and house the

needy, prepare people for employment, educate about nutrition, empower women, stabilize

neighborhoods, care for orphans, support those formerly incarcerated, provide clean water, serve those struggling w addictions, welcome immigrants, and many others to lengthy to mention. The thank you's we receive are of extravagant gratitude and some tell us our contribution has literally allowed them to survive another year. Little could Fr. Jim imagine, when he signed that first tithing check, the ripple effect it would have.

"The Kingdom of God is like a mustard seed, the smallest of seeds, yet when it grows, it

becomes the largest of plants and becomes a tree so that the birds of air can perch on its

branches."

As we begin our 47th year of tithing, we have tithed over \$4,000,000-that is our endowment.

And when Fr. Enrique endeavored to accompany more groups of parishioners to Chiapas, Fr. Jim said, YES!

When those groups returned and wanted to start a Mission to help the community, Fr. Jim said, YES!

When that Mission thought of starting a micro-credit system to help families who couldn't open bank accounts, Fr. Jim said, YES!

When mothers asked for help with student expenses and we imagined a scholarship program, Fr. Jim said, YES!

YES! to pilgrimages,

YES! to fiestas,

YES! to colorful banners hung from the rafters for Chiapas Sunday celebrations,

YES! to a giant Lady of Guadalupe in front of the lectern (which only fell over once in all these years),

YES! to processing in with an explosion of flowers,

YES! to selling coffee to help the indigenous farmers,

YES! to solo singing "Oye nos Señor" (Listen to your people, Lord) for Chiapas Sunday masses - so many of us would just weep at how beautiful that was.

17 Haiti Hope

Father Jim, you are truly a blessing, and we are all grateful.

We believe that you are a modern-day prophet. You are humble and a person gifted with more than ordinary spiritual insight. In 1979, your first trip to Haiti stirred your heart and your soul. We remember as you tearfully spoke of how profoundly your life had been changed and how that experience would affect our parish community as well as Haiti. We learned as a community that we must become interconnected to the world.

We needed to become world citizens. You called us to demonstrate our commitment to the people of Haiti, and so we did! That commitment continues to this day, 28 years later. Through the efforts of our parish community and the leadership of Rosemarie Chierchi, we were able to establish the Ministry of H.O.P.E. our Haitian outreach.

Father Jim, your call to action was heeded - from pennies for donkeys, to dollars for clean water, to pancake breakfasts to support rebuilding the hospital, to concerts for solar energy, to mobile clinics traveling the mountainsides of Borgne. Today, H.O.P.E supports the community driven model for public health for over 85,000 in the commune of Borgne.

Father Jim, your deeply felt vision did come true!! AND we know that the needs and challenges remain great! Your call to action remains a motivating force. Know that we have every intention of continuing to deepen our commitment to the beautiful people of Borgne.

This year we finally achieved making a connection with our local Haitian community. With the help of our new Haitian friends, we created a celebration of Haitian culture that not only raised funds for Borgne but made a solid connection with our local Haitian community!

Father Jim, you would have loved it! It was fantastic. We will continue to be stewards of your commitment to be world citizens.

19 Grace of God

My name is Elly Majors, and I was honored when our director, Mark Bennet asked me to deliver the Yellow Rose tribute to Father Jim, on behalf of the house. I am happy to be joined by residents, staff, volunteers, board members, and alumni of the Grace of God Recovery House. My personal relationship with Fr. Jim started in June of 2005. I was in the depths of some bad addiction-driven behavior and had driven off virtually everyone who cared about me. Father Jim counseled me and took the time to convince me that God would forgive me, and still loved me, and suggested a plan to help me. He suggested I return to AA, start going to SA, and go over to Grace of God Recovery house to see if Sr. Margie needed another volunteer. I can say that I'm still involved in all Three.

Sister Margie said something about Fr, Jim sending her another one of his reclamation projects, and put me to work cleaning her bevy of electric floor fans. But I was immediately impressed with the culture she and Fr. Jim had started with this ministry over 25 years ago: the culture of showing drug and alcohol addicts how a system of structure and love can supplement existing recovery systems, resulting in total self- esteem restoration. After a couple of years, Sr. Margie asked me to join the staff, and being here has been an integral part of my recovery program. Fr. Jim would show his love for the house by joining us a couple times a year for our Wednesday night dinner and Sharing For Life group. He would be a full participant, along with current house residents, the staff, and several alumni. He would always be a staunch supporter and mentor that we could learn from. Here's a short story as evidence of his character: At one of our GOG staff meetings, Sr. Margie noted that someone had broken into Fr. Jim's house and stolen his flat screen TV. A parishioner had given him a replacement, but it didn't have a remote so it could operate. I said I could get him a universal remote and program it for him. It took me about 10 minutes after getting to Fr. Jim's house to get his TV up and running.

After he gave me a tour of his house and the neighborhood, I asked him if he would lock his doors in the future. He said, "No. whoever took the TV need it more than I did, and look – I have an even better one now, and I even got to spend time with you." Every one of the people you see standing up here knows the impact Fr. Jim has had on this house and our lives. We will always carry with us the caveat I use whenever I have to make a big decision. That caveat is: What would Fr. Jim do?

Thanks Fr. Jim for everything.





20 Mental Health

Fr. Jim, you have been a support to the Mental Health Center since the beginning. At the first meeting, when a group of mental health practitioners got together just to talk about the idea, you were there.

Over the years, you offered support and encouragement to each of our directors. We each knew you believed in us and in the mission of the Center.

And you were intentional about joining us in our mission to break down barriers and reduce the stigma, by referring people to us and including those with mental health challenges in your homilies and in the consecration.

Folks in the Living Room still talk about how much they enjoyed your visits.

You made us – staff and those who consult the center – feel seen and included. You have left an indelible mark on us. Thank you.

21 Farmworkers

My name is Kathleen Tranelli, and I am here with other members of the Spiritus Farmworker Justice Ministry to honor Fr. Jim and to thank him for his longtime support of our work for farmworker justice in NY State. Our Ministry Leader, Marilu Aguilar, couldn't be here tonight but sends her love. Twenty-one years ago, parishioners led by Marilu participated in a 10-day march to Albany with farmworkers and allies to promote passage of the Farmworkers Fair Labor Practices Act. When we returned, Fr. Jim listened, he heard, and he endorsed our work, perhaps in part based on his own experience of outreach to farmworkers during his seminary days. With Fr. Jim's support and encouragement, over the years we educated our Spiritus community about the injustices to NYS farmworkers and mobilized parishioners to advocate for passage of the Farmworker Bill to give them basic workers' rights and dignity. Fr. Jim addressed farmworker rights in some of his homilies, again validating our efforts. Starting in 2010, Fr. Jim joined a contingent of parishioners who marched in the Labor Day parade to draw attention to the Farmworker Bill. He marched with us every single year, wearing his red bandana in solidarity with farmworkers. What a powerful witness! Fr. Jim shared our joy when the Bill was passed in 2019, then continued to march with us to be a public voice and supportive presence for farmworkers.

Fr. Jim, you've been our role model for persisting in our work for the poor and marginalized. You have inspired us to never give up. Like the persistent widow you've preached about in your homilies, we kept the faith and kept going many years to help bring justice and victory to farmworkers. To quote from one of your homilies, ONLY PRAYER AND PERSISTENCE WILL OVERCOME OUR DISILLUSIONMENT AND ENABLE US TO KEEP GOING, AND GOING AND GOING TILL JUSTICE REIGNS, EVEN IF WE DON'T SEE IT. We will continue living the social gospel and being persistent as you have modeled for us all these years. Thank you. We love you.



22 Mother Earth

Fr Jim has shown his support for our ministry through his actions. When we started asking parishioners to bring their own place settings to Mass in the Park, Fr Jim was one of the first to do it. He showed up with a basket with his supplies. His quiet example spoke volumes for us.

Our Mother Earth Ministry encourages living simply. Fr. Jim has been doing that his whole life. He refused his first parish assignment because he thought the rectory was too plush. His deep faith and unwavering dedication to living Christ's message have been a source of strength for so many.

Fr Jim often mentions the beauty and wonder of nature and the universe in his homilies and has encouraged us to continue the Green Spots. He has followed many of the suggestions we offer such as signing up for community solar energy and he's been saving up to buy an electric car. He cares for birds and once tried composting. We will always remember Father Jim's words at the end of Mass, after he gives us a blessing. He tells us to go out and make the world a better place. Changing the world is hard! We must overcome fear, inertia and apathy. Through his words and actions, Father Jim makes us believe that we can do it - and do it with great joy.



23 SPARC

Father Jim, back at Corpus Christi, there was a point at which you knew that many things were going well, but the work of living out the Gospel of Jesus wasn't done. If the parish was going to make all people welcome "at the table," this meant that people of different viewpoints, genders, sexual orientations, and races had to be not only in the parish, but also at the table of leadership.

We are benefiting from decisions that you made about this back then. One decision was to hire Myra Brown, a psychiatric nurse, an accomplished singer, and a Catholic lay leader who had just wowed her church, St. Bridget's Church, with her first homily.

24 LGBTQIA++

Many of us know that Father Jim has been a steadfast advocate of the LGBTQIA+ community throughout his life in ministry.

In preparing for this evening folks sent statements describing the love of Jesus they experienced from his participation in their major turning points: coming out, estrangement from families, getting married, the loss of a partner, and just dealing with being 'othered' by traditional churches. The warm, inclusive welcome we experienced in Corpus and Spiritus flows out of the radical hospitality which Father Jim exudes.

Of the many anecdotes we have heard in recent days regarding Father Jim, who I have always referred to as Ally Number One, this piece by Linda DiStefano stands out. It perfectly captures his loving openness:

'Fast forward to 1990, AIDS was devastating the LGBTQ community in Rochester. Two of my dearest friends, Tom and Rob, were diagnosed with HIV/AIDS. There was no cure at the time. They were Catholic, but their church turned away from them. I heard how Fr. Callan was administering the Sacraments to people with HIV/AIDS. He was my priest, so I contacted him. Before the sun set that day, he was at Tommy's side at Highland Hospital. The same when Rob became ill later that year. The thing I remember hearing about is that Fr. Jim "was not afraid to touch them." That's when I knew that if Jesus truly does send saints to earth, Fr. Jim is one of them. Tom and Rob both passed away later that year. Their funerals were held at Corpus Christi with Fr. Jim officiating, along with "Pastoral Assistant" (now Reverend) Mary Ramerman.'

I met Father Jim on my first visit to Corpus in 1991 as a 26-year-old attending my friend's funeral. Corpus was one of the few churches that extended unconditional hospitality to the families of young people who succumbed to that heartbreaking illness. I was inspired by the genuine celebration of the person David who was an out, loud and proud gay man, a drag queen, a person unafraid to express the fullness of the life God intended for him.

The fearless acceptance of Father Jim and the Corpus community was and is unequaled and will never be forgotten. Father Jim chose this David Hawkins excerpt for a homily at a Thursday Night Mass I attended ten years ago. I will close with it, as it now describes the life he has lived:

'Make a gift

of your life

and lift all mankind

by being kind,

considerate,

forgiving,

and compassionate

at all times,

in all places,

and under all conditions,

with everyone

as well as yourself.

This is

the greatest gift

anyone can give.'

Father Jim, on behalf of the LGBTQIA+ community, words cannot express our unending gratitude for your perfect love. You have truly made a gift of your life.

We thank you for 'not being afraid to touch us', and I just know the mother of all parties is being planned for your arrival in paradise by the many amazing gay boys we bid heartbreaking farewells to in our church during our days of crisis. Give them our regards, until we meet again.

25 Speaking from the Heart/ Lydia's Closet

Speaking from the Heart was started in 2013, as a way for new refugees to our city to practice conversational English in an atmosphere of friendship. Our group was always meant to be an inclusive one that would not promote any one religion. When our founder, Karen Heavey, heard from some community members who wanted to use our group to convert refugees to Christianity, she sought out Fr. Jim in a panic. He agreed that had to be prevented. He said, "Here at Spiritus, we don't choose to TELL people about Christ so much as we choose to be the hands and feet of Christ and SHOW them the love he taught us." Throughout the years, as Marybeth Knowles and now Lydia Rodriguez have become our leaders, Father Jim has always offered us encouragement, even if it was a "keep it up, you're doing good work". I think what it comes down to is a smile or a hug and a good word from Father Jim makes you feel as though as you've connected to the spirit of God, and just by the way he treats people, and the way he lives HIS life - makes us all want to be better and do better.





26 Adult Enrichment

SWIFT

Dr. Shawnee Daniels-Sykes - a nurse, theologian, and Little Sister of Notre Dame - founded Sisters Walking in Faith Together or SWIFT. Dr. Daniels-Sykes passed away from cancer in 2022 leaving Courtney Davis as the ministry's sole surviving member. She could have carried Shawnee's legacy anywhere, because we, who live with chronic illness and disability, are everywhere. So, why Spiritus? Because like Shawnee, you, Fr. Jim, have spoken truth to power, despite great personal risk.



His love of music, and insistence on the inclusion of all types of music in our worship parallels how he lived his life and modeled it for all of us – that all should be included. As our world grows and changes, he encourages our music ministry to also grow, change and be open to new ideas and music. 19 For 50 years, you have embodied the love of Christ in Rochester. You were the face of Jesus to thousands of people, relentlessly teaching them about--and enacting--God's unconditional love. From your illness, we can only conclude that God has perhaps grown a little tired of sharing you with us, and now wants you back home.

20 Of course, we will miss you always, and so we say: Thank you! Thank you! Thank you! Jim, your heart has touched mine deeply through so many years, as you've walked by my side on my personal and family journey with kindness and care.

I treasure every memory!

The statement that we feel best exemplifies Fr. Jim to us is, "courageous, divinely inspired leadership".

30 Having grown up in a traditional RC church and spent 12 years in parochial schools, I was shocked when Fr. Jim asked me my name the 1st time I received communion from him at Corpus Christi. It touched my heart as he said "Body of Christ, Dorothy" that 1st time and each time after that. (only ever asked my name once) I also love Fr. Jim's quote "the Church is a place for sinners, not Saints" Fr. Jim really made me feel so special & welcomed at God's table. I knew this was the church for me.

31 In April of 2011 I suffered from a variety of illnesses starting with a heart attack and followed by months of problems breathing and general physical weakness. I was hospitalized several times with no improvement. In August, having been admitted again, Father Jim came to pray over me as he had done on many of my previous hospitalizations. He offered to anoint me, which I gladly accepted. Shortly after Father Jim left, my doctor came in to examine me once again and became somewhat agitated that nothing was being done at the hospital. He left my bedside and soon one of the nurses came in to tell me that I was scheduled for a procedure later that day. During that procedure they diagnosed a general condition and widespread infection which they began treating. This all culminated in an operation in October to repair the internal condition that was causing my ill health. If it had not been for Father Jim's anointing me and his prayers, as well as the prayers of many families and friends, I might not have survived.

31 When I think of Fr. Jim, I always think of the words "YES, the answer will always be YES!" (When I asked whether he'd do a funeral for a friend who was a non-believer.)

32 When I think of Father Jim, what comes immediately to my mind is LOVE and ALWAYS BEING PRESENT.

33 My words for Fr. Jim are: Welcoming, kind, and compassionate blue eyes.

34 Not good at writing but would like to Thank Fr. Jim for always being there for everyone. He always smiling I attend the 7.30 Mass my daughter sons were baptized and received Frist Communion in his present. Peace to a wonderful man

37 When I think of Jim extraordinary and unforgettable are the words that come to my mind!!

41 Big Guy

One of the kindest and most loving souls I ever met is Fr. Jim.

I am guessing it was 1996, when my counselor suggested giving Corpus Christi Church a try. I had mentioned to her that I had not been to church in twenty years. Well, the way she said it piqued my interest, so, I walked through the front doors of Corpus Christi and never looked back. This beautiful church seemed to hum with a sacred history. The air smelled of familiar scents of candles and of incense aromas that lingered. Mass was just starting when I arrived, and the pews were impressively full. I found a spot off to the side and that is where I first saw Fr. Jim, who later became Big Guy to me.

People often asked me why I called him that, as he was around 5'6" in height. I told them that they were looking at his outward appearance and not at his inward appearance.

Listening to him preach, only took a short while to realize his heart was as big as they come. His sincere passion and love for all was totally evident. His joyful and infectious smile revealed his extraordinary person. Where did this guy come from; I asked myself? Wow! Without exaggeration, his heart was radiating love and acceptance to the entire congregation. You could feel it hugging you as he spoke. I also observed a lot of diversity in the pews, as Fr. Jim had said all were welcome. I knew then, I was home.

I took the time to explain to him why I was calling him Big Guy, because of his enormous heart. Well, do you know how he answered me? He calls me Big Guy. Get a load of that. Fr. Jim will always be my Big Guy, who saved my life. 12-1-24

41 Father jim was a part of our extended family before I even knew him .

After college, I came to Rochester but my dad still in Elmira, my home town was experiencing a whole new perspective on Catholicism at St Peter and Paul with Father Jim.

Dad was extremely conservative .. and way too solemn, almost to the point of suffering while he prayed. Father Jim showed him a whole new level of love, openness and joy to be experienced while he worshiped! Shortly after, dad died suddenly of a massive heart attack at 59. In Rochester, 1977, I had left the church and married John at a justice of the peace- still believing in God, but no interest in Catholicism.

Mom, still in Elmira, who also loved Fr Jim, said "Frannie, go check him out at Corpus Christi- I think you will be pleasantly surprised."

I was reluctant, but said "come on John, let's get a glimpse of this guy." The rest is history, with him baptizing Audrey, marrying Audrey and Dave, blessing our marriage, and baptizing Isabella

Audrey wrote her thesis on him at Georgetown (only a few years after Jim was fired ") ! The Jesuits were hanging over her shoulders, as they nationally had heard all about him, and told her how proud they were of his actions !! Most of all, Fr Jim showed us "what Jesus would do", but in such a captivating way.....always with a powerful story .

And we promise to carry out your work, Fr Jim.

Thank you for your incredible inspiration, hope, healing & for showing us a forgiving God . We love you. You will always be in our hearts.

42 My word would be "saint" as I have told so many people that I feel he is a modern-day saint who doesn't just talk the talk, but walks it every day!

He has inspired me and my family in so many ways and I trust his trip to heaven will be instantaneous upon his death.

43 It is just over 2 years since we attended our first mass at Spiritus Christi; a 5 pm mass in the Sanctuary.

Father Jim came right to us before the mass and introduced himself and talked so freely and genuinely with us. We were taken with him right away. We knew he was special.

Every mass after that he would come over and say, "Hello John and Lisa" and continue to engage in conversation.

We miss his tremendous smile and the twinkle in his eye. We pray for his comfort and peace.

44 SUNLIGHT

45 Of course, it is impossible to come up with one word or phrase about this precious human being....

Here is one aspect of my experiences with Father Jim that has meant so much to me:

Always fully present with you.

46 Father Jim has meant a lot to me and my family, the Drexler's, for many years. He presided over the funeral of our Uncle Pat Drexler after his unexpected and untimely death in 2017. My parents would often drive from Geneva up to Rochester for the Sunday Masses at Hochstein because they enjoyed them so much (especially the music!). When my husband Erik and I moved to Rochester in 2022, we found our way to Spiritus and were immediately welcomed by the community. Though we no longer live in Rochester and our time in the community was brief, it was memorable. We are incredibly grateful to Father Jim for his kindness, acceptance, and love. Spiritus was very much a "safe" and a happy place for us, and this was in large part due to Father Jim's warmth and authenticity. We love you, Father Jim, and are so grateful for

everything you have done for our family and for the community. 47 Dear Father Jim:

You are a role model for so many people, including myself. I am thinking of ALL the people who attended junior high youth group, senior high youth group, and have left the Rochester area who are now "young adults" and "not so young adults" You touched so many of our lives in ways big and small through your love and your example. I love you.

48 Father Jim, your legacy lives on in us. You have taught us so much about leading by example, demonstrating our faith with action and the hard work of attempting to see God's light in everyone that we meet. We both searched for a life partner who would dedicate their soul to making this world a kinder, braver and more just place for others, and we realized that your teaching has made us each the perfect match for each other. Our family is your legacy. Each week, you instruct our family to go out to love and serve others and we do this together, forging deep connections with each other and with our community. You always make us feel special, loved and seen when you remember bits and pieces of our lives. We miss you every day and love you so much.

49 Since starting as Spiritus in 1999 right after the split, Father Jim has always been a constant presence for me even when I have not been as consistent with church over the years. What I love about Father Jim is he has always practiced what he preaches. Our world would be a much better place if all religious figures lived their lives more like Father Jim. He has always stood up for what's right and gave a voice to those who need it most. I am grateful he has been part of my life and will always continue to be through his wisdom and actions.

50 Father Jim has talked the talk and walked the walk in my life, exemplifying what it means to be a true follower of Jesus. I am honored to have been blessed by him over and over again, as I was baptized, did my first communion, reconciliation, confirmation with him, and he married my husband, and I. I will take these blessings with me always as I continue to give love to others in my community, fighting for justice and for our love. Thank you, Father Jim, for your years of fighting for justice on behalf of all people, and continually choosing to do what is right, regardless of the personal consequences. You have blessed our families, our community, and our cities a million times over.

51 Thank you for organizing this means of feedback. I would like to say that I first came to know Father Jim as a dedicated and passionate leader of Spiritus Christi Church. Upon getting deeper into the community and interacting personally with Father Jim I recall feeling nothing but warmth and genuine kindness in his presence; something that let me know that he was happy to have me. Easy smiles and hugs that I will never forget.

In learning about his extensive and radical work in the city of Rochester and in our faith community I am honored to know him. I believe that we as young adults in this congregation can and must preserve Father Jim's legacy. I feel it falls on us young people to carry on this vital

work in the wake of our sorrow.

52 We are deeply grateful for Father Jim's unwavering love and commitment to all parishioners, especially our young adults. When Lauren and I first visited Spiritus as a newly dating couple, we were searching for a spiritual community that aligned with our values. During our very first Sunday Mass at Hochstein, Father Jim warmly introduced himself within minutes of us sitting down. His kindness and the welcoming atmosphere immediately made us feel at home. Shortly after, we joined the Young Adult Ministry, where we've built meaningful friendships through shared service and fellowship. Thank you, Father Jim, for fostering such a vibrant and inclusive community.

53 I would like to say he has impacted my life in many ways. He always welcomed me in the church, and he always had open arms whenever I came in and made me feel welcomed there. He was there when I was born in the hospital, which was very special in many ways. Am very grateful he was there when I was born and blessed me. He did always make me feel special and welcomed into the Spiritus family.

54 When I think about Father Jim I think about his welcoming, loving smile and kind, nurturing spirit. His smile was one of the first things I noticed when I first came to Spiritus. He would greet me each week, commenting on my joy. When I gave my first homily, he made sure I knew where to go and what to do each step of the way so my only focus was on being present.

55 Ever since we got engaged, Father Jim would see us each time at church and say "6-8-24, right!?" We would gladly say yes. Though he wasn't able to be at our wedding, he was there in spirit. On our mini moon at Belhurst we went to Seneca Falls to a Florist shop and found a Medal for Father Jim. We sent it to him when we got home telling him how much we thought of him. Father Jim has a beautiful soul, and we are so grateful for all of his guidance in helping to shape Spiritus. We will always remember him as part of our Thursday Night Community. We are so grateful to him and know he will always be with us

56 In September 1963, I was a freshman on my way to classes at Mercy H.S. While sitting in the back of the St. Paul Blvd bus with friends, I remember that when it approached your stop, someone said, "Those boys are going to the seminary." I clearly remember how your peaceful, smiling face stood out from the others.

Then, through the years, we would see your photo in a newspaper article featuring an injustice which you and your church were fighting against. And there it was...the same peaceful expression.

Sometime around 1989, Mike, Ben and I happily decided that we were members of Corpus Christi Church. We wanted to be more than Catholics. We wanted to be Christians and to follow the teachings of Jesus. And we knew that you were the best person to lead the way. Words just are not adequate enough to tell you of the love and gratitude we have for you. You are in our hearts forever.

57 The word that comes to mind for me when I think of Father Jim is beacon. He is the beacon in the lighthouse that brought me back to faith after being away for 50 years.

58 I later learned that in August and September of 1998, Father Jim went through his own ending and new beginning, around the same time I was unapologetically in front of a dormitory of women on my knees praying to God for my life to change and in return promising to tell all who would listen. I felt lost and didn't trust my own decisions. As I reflect back, when I walked out of Monroe County Jail in September of 1998, I had no idea I would spend the next 25 years of my life helping others in the same facility. I can't help but feel grateful for Father Jim's courage, even though then it may not have looked like courage to others. God showed me that He works all things out, especially when we can't see His plan. I honor Father Jim for his obedience to God's call, which I now see as nothing short of miraculous. Whether we're behind physical bars or the invisible bars of the mind and soul, Father Jim has shown through his leadership and life example that the love of Jesus is the "key" to true freedom.

Thank you, Father James Callan and your blessed and anointed team for all that you have done and all that you continue to do, to impact needed change for cultures, for genders, for the families of God.

I believe I can speak for Jessie and Yvonne, (your first 3 prison outreach housed women) in saying that we love you, we honor you and we thank you!!

59 I want you to know the great influence Fr. Jim has had on my life. We worked together on Sanctuary, I went with him to El Salvador, Peter and I attended Immanuel Baptist Tuesday noon services, also services at Corpus Christi and Spiritus, we walked with farmworkers in the Labor Day Parade. His radiant, welcoming smile always drew me in and kept me within his warm light. He has always worked for justice, lived a life of lovingkindness, and walked humbly with God, Jesus, and all the rest of us. When our grandchildren graduated from college, I created Words to Ponder booklets which included his words of wisdom from June 2012:

Words of wisdom from Fr. Jim Callan of Spiritus Christi Church, June 2012

While Jesus didn't comment about the war in Afghanistan, abortion, homosexuality, nuclear weapons, women's ordination, etc., he gave us certain principles to live by. Most theologians and Christians agree (more or less) that these are the main points Jesus taught---and lived out through his own example:

1) Love God and love your neighbor as yourself ("These are the two greatest commandments")

2) Love your enemies ("Do good to those who hate you")

3) Forgive everyone. No exceptions ("seventy times seven times")

4) Seek reconciliation ("Leave your gift at the altar and reconcile with your brother or sister")

5) No revenge. No violence ("Don't repay injury with injury." "Put down the sword")6) Do not judge and do not condemn ("and you won't be judged or condemned either")

7) Don't be self-righteous ("Hypocrites, take the beam out of your own eye first")

8) Reach those who are in pain, rejected, addicted ("Heal the sick, cleanse lepers, cast out demons")

9) Serve the poor. Invite them to your table ("What you do for the least, you do for Me")

10) Beware of riches and possessions ("Avoid greed in all its forms")

11) Humbly serve others ("As I have washed your feet, go and wash others' feet")

12) Practice justice. Don't oppress people ("Seek first the justice and the Kingdom of God")

13) Be generous to all ("Give, and it will be given back to you in the same measure that you give")

14) Trust God and don't worry ("Don't worry about what you eat or drink or put on." "Where is your faith?")

Fr. Jim lived out every one of them. I thank God for him.
